A RARE AND UNIQUE COMMUNITY INDEED (BRIEF HISTORY)

From 60 acres of raw land in the middle of the Lewis and Clark National Forest in the Little Belt Mountains of Montana purchased in 2007 a small village has sprouted. Built by hand by creative, adventurous and generous souls that decided it was worth making the trip, spending some quality time and lending some elbow grease to help grow this small village into something truly unique and beautiful.

Now 75 acres (after annexing the only adjacent private parcel) this village will give refuge, inspiration and healing energy to those same souls and to many others who will choose to make it a home away from home. Now with 12 structures (most of them cordwood masonry style) and enough cabin space to sleep up to 18 people the Refuge (as it is called) is now hosting workshops and resident artists. And we are only just getting started!



world class performers as well and easily two of the top horn players in the whole Northwest!



OUR 2nd YEAR HOSTING A LOCAL ARTIST IN RESIDENCE




This years' artist in residence was Great Falls resident Samantha Houston. Here she is seated in front of her gorgeous mural she painted in Hokkaido Ramen and Sushi restaurant in Great Falls. Which is also incidentally how we found her. (One of our vets Sean Cameron simply had to know who did this mural and found out she was local!)

This is what she had to say about her stay at Thunderhead:

“When you're a busy multi-disciplinary artist and mother of two, life can be a constant barrage of sensation, noise, obligation, and self-imposed reminders that consistency of work is a blessing and to focus on what's right in front of you. Constant redirection and prioritization of energy becomes a lifeline as you juggle all of the things people say you should be grateful for. My first two days at ART were uncomfortable, not because of the people or the place but because of the absence. The absence of stimuli, the absence of need, the absence of expectation and production, the absence of definition. My everyday identity was meaningless with no formal function and no expectation to perform in all of the different areas I've carved out for myself. In the absence of defining characteristics and obligations I lacked shape and form. Slowly though, as time passed, and I allowed the calmness of the scenery to sink in, the absence filled. It filled with quiet, with verdant trees, wild flowers, and simplicity of purpose. Being at ART provided me with the space to reset my brain and my creative intake. It removed from me the distractions of daily life and the pressure of constantly performing a function. I could spend my time how I wanted and the gentleness and ease of the setting allowed my brain to relax and flow with the rhythm of nature; a state of calmness and receptivity that facilitated ideas and inspiration rising from the depths in a way that the turbulent waves of daily life would not allow. The variety of people and experiences that flowed in and out during my time at ART provided me with the kind of perspective and creative input I may not have otherwise had as their lives, adventures, skills, and passions were so different from mine. As soon as my daily life trickled away from consciousness, room was made for theirs instead and interaction enriched my experience in a way I had not anticipated.

I was deeply moved by my time at ART. I cannot recommend it enough for those who are seeking creativity, but especially for those already enmeshed and at times feeling overburdened by their creative endeavors. You probably need absence and peace more than you realize.”

Quite the photographer as well she took some amazing photos during her stay! Here are just a few of them.









ONCE AGAIN WE TOOK A GROUP TO BRAVE THE ENTIRE SLUICE BOX CANYON

Yes they arrived on bicycles from Calgary! They both had mad carpentry skills and Raphael needed a real challenge I realized. I gave him a choice of several large scale projects that needed to get done and he (with the help of Vincent) basically did ALL of them! They were instrumental in helping us finish the roof on the workshop, and finishing Salvador (including putting the 2nd story windows in and building a deck out the back), and THEN Raphael designed and they both built a deck on Poet's Cafe complete with carved totem poles!! And transformed the inside of the workshop with giant shelving units and re-organized and labeled everything. All in two weeks time. It was truly incredible!






